Hollord Choi

At first glance, Hollord Choi appears to be like most generation Z college transfer students. Getting settled into an apartment near CSULB, Hollord is preparing for studies in the health science field. He credits his parents for instilling a love of the Lord and recalls rarely missing a Sunday service. During family camping trips his

parents organized worship in the woods. At the invitation of a friend, Hollord began attending GVBC in March 2019.

Between academic demands, church and extracurricular activities, Hollord discovered the hobby of thrifting, which transitioned into other creative endeavors. "I took an AP course in environmental studies which explored the many ways the clothing industry takes a toll on the environment." He wished to repurpose well-made clothes into unique creations. Designing and customizing these garments gave them each a new life which Hollord examines in the context of his spiritual beliefs of our uniqueness in the eyes of God. "The clothes I create have a hidden symbolism that is revealed to me during the creative process. We are unique in His eyes and each creation is a representation of this thought. I think about the way I put outfits together as an opportunity to glorify the Lord with specificity and intent."

While putting together various design elements, Hollord is also mindful of the spiritual practice of discernment. "I try different colors, patterns and switch things around. There are times when it seems something is missing or not right so I try different elements." He describes being in the flow during these moments when his focus on his project is so sharpened that he loses track of time. Creating these garments is also a gift of love. He designed a reversible jacket for a friend's birthday. "I wished to give something of myself to my friend rather than purchase a gift I had no hand in making. I had the idea for making the jacket at midnight and worked all night until I saw the sun. I messed it up several times but I kept thinking about the way I envisioned the jacket. The final result was far more than I imagined."

During conversations with college advisor, Brad Toy, Hollord clarified his spiritual needs to both feed others and be fed and he feels that GVBC provides this balance. He enjoys the college ministry but also looks forward to the main service. "It is refreshing to see all ages come together in the Zoom breakout rooms; I get to share time with people of all ages." He contemplates how to use his unique gifts to serve the Lord. "Wouldn't it be great to create a line of T-shirts that had a crown of thorns or a Bible citation embedded in the design? The design may prompt others to question its meaning and it would create opportunities to answer questions about why as believers we are asked to love others who don't love us or who are unlovable. No one would ever feel excluded."



## Nihongo Service Reopening

What a joy it is to worship together in-person! Nihongo ministry started in-person Sunday service on June 20th after 15 months of being online. Before the Covid-19 pandemic started, we had around 100 people in Nihongo Sunday service every week. In our first in-person service after 15 months, we had 50 people in attendance. Out of 50 attendees, 6 of them were first time comers. They were watching Nihongo online service and decided to come to worship at church. We thank God for using Nihongo online service not only to nurture Nihongo members, but also to help non-churched Japanese people come to Christ.



Actually during the 15 months of online only services, over 200 people were watching Nihongo online service every week. This means Nihongo Sunday service attendance was doubled. And at least 5 people came to Christ through watching our online service. Praise the Lord! It is our great joy to come back to church to worship together in-person, but there is a great need to continue to provide good quality online services to help both our church members who cannot come to church with various reasons and non-Christian Japanese who are watching our online service. We had 50 people again in our second in-person service on June 27 and had 177 views online service on that day. Yes, it is our great joy to worship together in-person, but we thank God that more people are worshiping together with us in different places.
